Dolores Albarracín is a social psychologist who studies social cognition, communication, and behavioral change. She is the Amy Gutmann Penn Integrates Knowledge University Professor at the University of Pennsylvania and a fellow of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, the American Academy of Political and Social Science, and the Association for the Advancement of Science. She is also a fellow of the Society for Social and Personality Psychology, the American Psychological Association (Divisions 8, 9, and 38), the Association for Psychological Science, and the Society for Experimental Social Psychology. Her research (~ 250 publications) has been recognized with an award for Outstanding Mid–Career Contributions to the Psychology of Attitudes and Social Influence from the Society of Social and Personality Psychology, as well as the Diener Award in Social Psychology and the Career Contribution Award from the same society. In 2025, along with four other social psychologists, she also received the BBVA Frontiers of Knowledge Award in Social Sciences.
